In addition to advanced technology and major equipment purchases, your donations transform the healthcare experience for patients and their families.

PEACEFUL PORTS

Our Peaceful Ports™ program provides soothing and comfortable spaces for our patients and their families in our hospitals. Surroundings have a major impact on our well-being and mental health. Our Peaceful Port™ spaces feature soft lighting, fireplaces, artwork, wifi, comfortable seating, televisions and greenery to create a homelike environment.

Through the Peaceful Ports™ program, this year, we supported the Dr. L.A. Miller Centre with an exercise room, and transformed Palliative Care doors. At the Health Science Centre, work has commenced on 4 North A (inpatient oncology), and at St. Clare's, we focused on the Senior's Friendly Unit on the 7th Floor. We have also completed the internal renovation of the Recovery Centre.













COMFORT IN CARE

Comfort in Care™ Grants support our acute care and long-term care units. The Comfort in Care program allows healthcare workers to identify items to make the patient experience more comfortable.

Your donations purchased comfort items such as patient and nurse pocket talkers, Broda chairs (specialty transportation for immobile patients), outdoor therapeutic activities for mental health residents, sleeper chairs, a portable shampoo basin on a stand, iPads and gardening stations.

EXERCISE MEDICINE ROOM

Thanks to the generosity of the Newfoundland and Labrador Realtors Association and an anonymous donor, the Miller Centre Exercise Room has been redeveloped. The Room has allowed the Miller Centre to introduce GLAD Canada's hip and knee osteoarthritis management program, that helps return function to the lower extremities through targeted exercise and movement. The Exercise Medicine Room is being used by both outpatients and inpatients at the Miller Centre.

\$2,215,520 IN VITAL EQUIPMENT AND TECHNOLOGY

INTEGRATED OPERATING SUITES

TradesNL has made the commitment to transforming 17 Integrated Operating Suites. So far, their donations have supported the upgrading of 12 Integrated Operating Rooms-with 5 more to go. This year, \$515,355 of donor funds supported Integrated Operating Suites. These next generation operating suites have all surgical equipment coming from ceiling booms, reducing the amount of staff required to perform each surgery, reducing risks of infections, improving efficiencies, staff and patient safety, and impacting outcomes in a more technologically advanced environment.



CARDIAC CATHERIZATION LABS

Cardiac Catherization Labs perform tests and procedures including ablation, angiogram, angioplasty, and pacemaker/defibulator implantation. This year, our donors gave \$549,000 into a new Cath Lab, that will benefit cardiac patients from all across Newfoundland and Labrador.





3T MRI

The final installment of \$134,800 was made towards our 3T MRI machine. Since delivery in 2018, the 3T MRI has performed thousands of vital scans each year. The 3T MRI helps investigate and diagnose conditions with greater accuracy, patient safety and comfort.



LONG-TERM CARE

This year, we upgraded a number of pieces of equipment and furniture used by patients and care providers in long-term care. Our donors funded the purchase of approximately \$60,000 in new items, like wheelchairs for Pleasant View Towers, eight tablets, 14 geriatric positioning chairs, and much more.



AMBULATORY CARE

Proceeds from our Gurney Cup golf tournament made it possible to purchase an infrared vein finder and Echo Point of Care Ultrasound for Ambulatory Care.



MOVING LIVES FORWARD SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Thanks to NAPE's multi-year commitment of \$180,000, Moving Lives Forward became a province-wide scholarship program in 2020. Each year, \$45,000 in scholarships is awarded to recipients from adult mental health and addictions programs to pursue educational opportunities. The Moving Lives Forward Scholarship Program allows participants to grow and heal through the pursuit of personal development, skills training and advancing education.



RAPID RESPONSE TRAINING

RBC continues to support mental health initiatives through donations to the Health Care Foundation. This year, RBC provided \$30,000 in funding to the Rapid Response Team and Psychological First Aid (PFA) facilitator training. The Rapid Response Team addresses the psychological safety needs of employees and physicians by providing opportunities to meet and debrief with facilitators. PFA aims to reduce stress symptoms and assist in a healthy recovery following a traumatic event, natural disaster, public health emergency, or even a personal crisis.



ED ROCHE ART FUNDRAISER

Acclaimed local artist Ed Roche made a collection of his Newfoundland and European paintings available for sale, with proceeds supporting local Mental Health programs. Ed's work is proudly displayed in Peaceful Ports™, helping to create a more calm, home-like environment.



SUPPORTING CARDIAC CARE

One in three Newfoundlanders and Labradorians will require cardiac care in their lifetime. Help us make sure our cardiac team has the best tools to get you better. Your donation helps patients, right here at home.

I spent a lifetime committed to physical fitness and healthy living. I ran marathons, participated in triathlons, tried every adventure sport imaginable, and was a former army paratrooper with over 600 parachute descents. But then my life changed.

I noticed I was getting short of breath, suffered dizzy spells when I stood up, and found my pulse rate fluctuated wildly for no apparent reason. As a result, I was referred to Dr. Sean Connors at the Health Sciences Centre and was diagnosed with atrial fibrillation.

Dr. Connors prescribed a suite of medications to combat my condition. That worked initially, but after a couple of years, my situation continued to deteriorate. I was tired all the time, my energy level dropped, and I couldn't sleep. Significant fainting spells followed, in public, and at home. After three such incidents in one week, I recognized the importance of re-contacting with Dr Connors. Upon examining me, he determined I should receive an implanted cardiac defibrator.

I cannot describe the difference this device has made in my life. It brought me back from the brink of death. Dr. Connors and his team display amazing care and compassion in their handling of heart patients. They take the fear out of the unknown and of being ill.



FEBRUARY IS CARDIAC MONTH

Row4Heart was set to return to Capital Subaru on February 12, 2022, but was cancelled due to the third wave of the COVID-19 pandemic. The need for cardiac equipment remained, and through one time initiatives, we successfully raised \$150,130 to purchase an endoscopic vessel harvesting system; a tool used for coronary artery bypass graft surgery that makes smaller incisions, resulting in reduced infection rates, pain and scarring.



OUR VOLUNTEERS

Each year, the Health Care Foundation relies heavily on the generosity and support of our volunteers. We count on volunteers assist with our special events, serve our Board of Directors, to help the Foundation fulfil it's mandate. We are humbled that you share your time and resources with us.

The Health Care Foundation provided \$50,000 of support to myCardiacHealth. myCardiacHealth software is being developed to improve access to cardiac care using evidence-based logic to prioritize the most acute and appropriate patients.

FIRST RESPONDER PSYCHOLOGICAL SAFETY COLLABORATIVE

The First Responder Psychological Safety Collaborative was launched in 2021, and made possible because of funding from donors to the Health Care Foundation. The Collaborative opens lines of communication between agencies, departments and organizations that work closely to keep us safe. The calls these first responders attend are stressful and extreme, with the potential to overwhelm an individual's usual coping abilities. The First Responder Psychological Safety Collaborative provides a valuable mental health resource for our first responders.

On March 23, the Health Care Foundation worked with first responder agencies and VOCM Cares to raise \$70,842 on our first ever First Responder Psychological Safety Collaborative Radiothon. Proceeds from the Radiothon support the St. John's Regional Fire Department, Rovers Search and Rescue, Royal Newfoundland Constabulatory, Eastern Health Paramedicine and other volunteer first responder agencies. Volunteers from TradesNL, Fortis, helped on the phone lines.

RECOVERY CENTRE

Thanks to the proceeds of the Health Care Foundation Home lottery, we are proud to support the Recovery Centre with a \$600,000 commitment toward the redevelopment of the mental health and addictions inpatient facility through our Peaceful Ports™program.This year, we completed our commitment with the final \$200,000 in funding.

GURNEY CUP

Our 2021 Gurney Cup Golf Tournament was our first in-person event since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The event adapted to public health measures and was a tremendous success. The 2021 Gurney Cup took place at The Wilds, and raised \$121,520 for Mental Health and Ambulatory Care.

A big congratulations to Team Mental Health, the 2021 Gurney Cup Winner! Our winning twosome, Mitch Kennedy and Michael Flemming from NLCU chose to donate the Gurney Cup grand prize of \$5,000 to Mental Health. Gurney Cup proceeds made it possible to fund bariatric stretchers, portable bladder ultrasound scanner, infrared vein finder and an echo point of care ultrasound.









TREE OF MEMORIES

Our Tree of Memories program, in support of Comfort in Care™, has been a Christmas tradition for over 30 years. This year, our patron, Margaret Butt, shared Christmas memories of her beloved Mother and Mother-in-Law.

The beautiful one-hour Making Spirits Bright broadcast was filmed at St. Mary's Church, featuring live music from acclaimed local musicians Peter Halley and Shelley Neville, The Celtic Fiddlers, Craig Sharpe, and Spirit of Newfoundland. Tree of Memories Making Spirits Bright was broadcast across Canada on NTV three times over the holiday season.











\$510,970 IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATION

Applications come from Eastern Health staff and physicians who want to solve problems to better serve patients. These studies have real and lasting impacts.

EASTERN HEALTH STAFF SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year, we provide \$10,000 in scholarships to staff in our hospitals, so they can keep up to date with advances in their fields, and in turn, provide optimal care for our patients.

CANADIAN NURSING ASSOCIATION GRANTS

Nurses are the heart of our hospitals and patient-centred care. Each year, thanks to Johnson Insurance, nurses can apply to have their certification and re-certification covered by the Health Care Foundation. The program is available to staff in all departments. This year, Canadian Nursing Association (CNA) Grants program recently awarded 33 grants, totaling \$15,000.



TRANSLATIONAL GENOMICS

The Centre for Translational Genomics was identified as an Eastern Health priority. In partnership with the Cancer Care Foundation and the Janeway Children's Hospital Foundation, the Health Care Foundation has made a \$100,000 commitment over two years. This year, we contributed \$50,000 to this fund.

"Our research project supports the fundamentals of trauma management training. Our goal is to enhance family medicine training through simulation and this project benefits learners by developing their ability to practice in rural and remote settings.

Partnerships are being formed between government, industry, and innovators from Memorial University and CNA. We are proud to help these great minds with visions make a difference in healthcare, right here at home.

Bounce Health Innovation was launched in January 2018 to connect frontline healthcare workers with developers, designers, patients and entrepreneurs. Bounce accelerates the growth of the health innovation sector in Newfoundland and Labrador with the vision to make the province a testbed for medical technology innovation.

Bounce engages with and supports medical innovators and entrepreneurs by leveraging resources within a unique health innovation ecosystem. Bounce brings economic activity and new jobs to Newfoundland and Labrador.

The Health Care Foundation is proud to partner with Bounce Health Innovation. This year, our donors contributed \$100,000 to local medical innovation initiatives.

INNOVATION CENTRE

ActivePure Medical supported local innovation with a gift of \$100,000 to the Innovation Centre. The Innovation Centre is led by Eastern Health to transform healthcare in Newfoundland and Labrador.


Our 2021 Health Care Foundation Home Lottery was our most successful yet, raising \$1,479,972 for our healthcare!




